### **November Meeting Highlights**

The November meeting was full of program and committee leadership updates, Winter Dinner plans, an AAS honorable mention award and another very interesting educational program, on vermicomposting.

Eloisa Garza provided an update on the Plainfield Correctional Facility garden program. This year there were some issues related to staff challenges. Eloisa shared that the facility advisory committee fully supports the program and will make every effort



to ensure safety. The garden is being moved and will be larger next year. She added that 1700 lbs. of vegetables were harvested from the garden this year!

Dick Meier discussed that plans are underway to replace the raised beds in the Demo Garden. Metal beds will likely be utilized as some of the wood beds are in disrepair. Additional beds might be added



to enhance both the look and gardening potential. Dick also showed the certificate we received for honorable mention in the All American Selections contest this past summer with the whimsical theme.

The educational program was on Vermicomposting, presented by Michele Jones, ANR for Morgan County. Michele was quite knowledgeable about how and why vermicomposting is so beneficial, types of worms which work best, and the supplies and costs, which are relatively inexpensive. As much as 30% of household waste can be reduced and the result is nutrient rich humus which can be added to plants.

### MGs Judge at FFA Convention By Vicki Coleman

The 96th annual FFA National Convention Floriculture judging was held at the Indiana State Fair Grounds November 1st. There were teams from Hawaii to Puerto Rico. Hendricks County Master Gardeners were

well represented as judges.

The first activity was judging a winning team from each state in how they worked



together to set up a flower shop booth. They were given instructions and items and they had 45 minutes to complete their booth and answer questions from the judges. Each team had two judges and each judge judged at least two teams. There is a list of what to judge and each is given a score of 0 to 10.

The afternoon activity was judging pinching a coleus to be ready in 5 weeks for a holiday festival. We were all scratching our heads; judging pinching? They were



giving 9 minutes to pinch, and we had 1 minute to ask them 3 questions. The wording was a little different from what we were given but basically, "Why did you pinch the area you pinched?", "Did you accomplish your goal", and "What do you think it will look like in 5 weeks?". This was an individual student practicum. Some of the coleus really got a haircut!

We had to deal with a freezing building, Wi-fi/computer issues, waiting for the next group, and a very long day. Otherwise, it was a wonderful group of kids and a great program.

# **Brown Marmorated Stink Bug By Colletta Kosiba**

The brown marmorated stink bug gets the award for the biggest pest in Indiana. This stink bug was first seen in



Pennsylvania, in September 1998. It is believed that the stink bug hitched a ride from Asia in a shipping container. They are harmful by crunching on over 100 plants such as ornamental fruits and vegetable crops. It is a threat to the agricultural industry.

Beware!! They are seeking your nice warm house to spend the winter. These stink bugs are not harmful to people, houses, or pets. They do not bite, sting, suck blood, or spread disease. They do not eat or bore into wood structures. Sink bugs just want to wait out the winter in your house. The stink bugs often gather on sunny exterior walls. Like most pests, the stink bug is able to maneuver into very small spaces. All it takes is a slit, crack, or crevice the width of a dime. Inspect your home and seal any place they can squeeze their way in.

Once in the house, you will notice them as they noisily fly around when the lights are on. If you pick them up or squash them, they will release their stink spray with a nasty odor. This is their natural defense mechanism to deter predators, hence their name. When you squish a stink bug, special pheromones are released in the air which could actually attract other stink bugs into your home. While they are a nuisance in the house, they do not pose a threat to us.
